A. Title and applicability

- The document describes the Corporate Social Responsibility Policy ("CSR policy") of Paramount Surgimed Limited ("PSL" or "the company"). It includes PSL vision, mission and other relevant attributes of Corporate Social Responsibility.
- The CSR policy shall be guided by PSL's corporate philosophy of respect for the individual and the society at large.
- The CSR policy has been formulated in accordance with Section 135 of the Companies Act 2013 and the CSR Rules 2014 and the relevant amendments / notifications / circulars.
- The CSR policy shall apply to all CSR programs of PSL.

B. Introduction

As a company dedicated to improving healthcare quality, PSL's Corporate Social Responsibility policy is a natural extension of its business philosophy and vision. PSL believes in a low carbon footprint philosophy and is committed to make its operations environmentally acceptable, on scientifically established standards.

C. Vision and Mission

PSL is committed to build a sustainable business with strong social relevance and a commitment to inclusive growth and contribute to the society by supporting causes on various concerns including road safety, healthcare, environmental sustainability, promoting education, promoting sports and other rural development activities as specified under the companies act.

In pursuance of our vision that PSL desires to be a 'global leader in the medical disposable industry', PSL is committed to building a sustainable business with strong social relevance. In alignment with our expertise in the medical field, we will prioritize initiatives that promote inclusive growth and positively impact public health, hygiene, and medical access, while also contributing to other societal concerns as specified under the Companies Act.

D. Purpose

The Companies Act, 2013 has brought greater emphasis on CSR with rules that provide guidance on minimum CSR spend, focus areas, implementation mechanism and reporting to the shareholders of the company.

PSL CSR Policy has been designed keeping in view the company's business vision, its CSR vision and long-term social objectives that the company wants to achieve. PSL CSR Policy has been created with the purpose to outline its CSR focus areas, review mechanism, execution process and reporting mechanism.

E. Responsibility of the Board of Directors

The responsibility of the Board of Directors shall be as under:

- a) To approve the CSR Policy & disclose the contents of such policy in its report and also place it on the Company's website;
- b) Ensure that the activities proposed in the CSR Policy are undertaken;
- Ensure that the company spends, in every financial year, at least 2% of average net profits of the company made during the 3 immediately preceding financial years, as required under Section 135 of the Companies Act, 2013 & Rules made thereunder;
- d) If company fails to spend the sum as mentioned above, then the Board shall, in its Report specify the reasons for not spending the amount or otherwise dealt in accordance to provisions as may be prescribed under Companies Act 2013 and Rule made thereunder.

F. Areas of CSR Activities

The Company is hereby devoted to direct its CSR resources, to a reasonable extent, for improving the quality of life of the people by focusing on the social causes, including but not limited to the following areas:

- Eradicating hunger, poverty and malnutrition, promoting health care including preventive health care and sanitation, including contribution to the Swacch Bharat Kosh set-up by the Central Government for the promotion of sanitation and making available safe drinking water;
- ii. Promoting education, including special education and employment enhancing vocation skills especially among children, women, elderly, and the differently abled and livelihood enhancement projects;
- iii. Promoting gender equality, empowering women, setting up homes and hostels for women and orphans; setting up old age homes, day care centres and such other facilities for senior citizens and measures for reducing inequalities faced by socially and economically backward groups;
- iv. Ensuring environmental sustainability, ecological balance, protection of flora and fauna, animal welfare, agroforestry, conservation of natural resources and maintaining quality of soil, air and water, including contribution to the Clean Ganga Fundset-up by the Central Government for rejuvenation of river Ganga;
- v. Protection of national heritage, art and culture including restoration of buildings and sites of historical importance and works of art; setting up public libraries; promotion and development of traditional arts and handicrafts;
- vi. Measures for the benefit of armed forces veterans, war widows and their dependents Central Armed Police Forces (CAPF) and Central Para Military Forces (CPMF) veterans, and their dependents including widows];;
- vii. Training to promote rural sports, nationally recognized sports, Paralympic sports and Olympic sports;
- viii. Contribution to the Prime Minister's National Relief Fund or 8[or Prime Minister's Citizen Assistance and Relief in Emergency Situations Fund (PM CARES Fund)] or any other fund set up by the Central Government for socio-economic development and relief and welfare of the Scheduled Castes, the Scheduled Tribes, and other backward classes, minorities and women;
- ix. (a) Contribution to incubators or research and development projects in the field of science, technology, engineering and medicine, funded by the Central Government or State Government or Public Sector Undertaking or any agency of the Central Government or State Government; and

(b) Contributions to public funded Universities; Indian Institute of Technology (IITs); National Laboratories and autonomous bodies established under Department of Atomic Energy (DAE); Department of Biotechnology (DBT); Department of Science and Technology (DST); Department of Pharmaceuticals; Ministry of Ayurveda, Yoga and Naturopathy, Unani, Siddha and Homoeopathy (AYUSH); Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology and other bodies, namely Defense Research and Development Organisation (DRDO); Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR); Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) and Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR), engaged in conducting research in science, technology, engineering and medicine aimed at promoting Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

- x. Rural Development Projects; and
- xi. Slum area development;

Explanation.- For the purposes of this item, the term `slum area' shall mean any area declared as such by the Central Government or any State Government or any other competent authority under any law for the time being in force.

xii. disaster management, including relief, rehabilitation and reconstruction activities.

G. EXCLUSIONS:

Following activities shall be excluded from the CSR expenditure of PSL:

- a) Activities which are exclusively for the benefit of employees of the company or their family members;
- b) Activities undertaken in pursuance of normal course of business of the Company;
- c) Direct or indirect contribution to political parties;
- d) Expenditure on item/s not in conformity with Schedule VII of the Companies Act 2013;
- e) Surplus arising out of CSR projects shall not form part of the business profits of Company instead the same will be further used for CSR purposes only.

H. Geographies and beneficiaries

Geographies

While the company's reach is pan-India, it will give priority to local communities near its facilities to foster direct relationships and see the impact of its contributions earmarked for CSR activities. PSL's operations are mainly concentrated in the following areas:

- Bhiwadi (Rajasthan)
- Bawal (Haryana)
- New Delhi

The beneficiaries of PSL's CSR programs may be the following categories of people:

- Children/students
- Women
- Weaker sections of the society
- Others society at large

I. Implementation mechanism

The company may conduct / implement CSR programs by itself and/or through -

- 1 (a) a company established under section 8 of the Act, or a registered public trust or a registered society, exempted under sub-clauses (iv), (v), (vi) or (via) of clause (23C) of section 10 or registered under section 12A and approved under 80 G of the Income Tax Act, 1961 (43 of 1961), established by the company, either singly or along with any other company; or
- (b) a company established under section 8 of the Act or a registered trust or a registered society, established by the Central Government or State Government; or
- (c) any entity established under an Act of Parliament or a State legislature; or
- (d) a company established under section 8 of the Act, or a registered public trust or a registered society, exempted under sub-clauses (iv), (v), (vi) or (via) of clause (23C) of section 10 or registered under section 12A and approved under 80 G of the Income Tax Act, 1961, and having an established track record of at least three years in undertaking similar activities.

Explanation.-For the purpose of clause (c), the term "entity" shall mean a statutory body constituted under an Act of Parliament or State legislature to undertake activities covered in Schedule VII of the Act.]

(2) (a) Every entity, covered under sub-rule (1), who intends to undertake any CSR activity, shall register itself with the Central Government by filing the form CSR-1 electronically with the Registrar, with effect from the 01st day of April 2021:

Provided that the provisions of this sub-rule shall not affect the CSR projects or programmes approved prior to the 01st day of April 2021.

- (3) A company may engage international organisations for designing, monitoring and evaluation of the CSR projects or programmes as per its CSR policy as well as for capacity building of their own personnel for CSR.
- (4) A company may also collaborate with other companies for undertaking projects or programmes or CSR activities in such a manner that the CSR committees of respective companies are in a position to report separately on such projects or programmes in accordance with these rules.
- (5) The Board of a company shall satisfy itself that the funds so disbursed have been utilised for the purposes and in the manner as approved by it and the Chief Financial Officer or the person responsible for financial management shall certify to the effect.
- (6) In case of ongoing project, the Board of a Company shall monitor the implementation of the project with reference to the approved timelines and year-wise allocation and shall be competent to make modifications, if any, for smooth implementation of the project within the overall permissible time period.

The progress will be submitted to the Board of Directors during the board meetings. The progress on CSR programs undertaken by the Company will be reported in the Annual Report in the format prescribed by the CSR Rules 2014.

The PSL CSR team shall be responsible for day-to-day management of CSR related activities of the company. The team shall periodically report to the Board regarding the financial and programmatic progress of CSR projects.

All projects undertaken by PSL shall be monitored on a regular basis. On-site monitoring would also be undertaken at least once a year to ensure on-track implementation.

The CSR team shall be empowered to appoint an external third party to monitor / review / audit the progress (financial and programmatic) of the CSR projects.

K. Effective Date

The CSR Policy shall be effective from the date of its approval by the Board of Directors. Provided, however, that all the acts done in pursuance of the earlier CSR Policy shall stand ratified and covered under this policy.

L. Amendments to the CSR Policy

CSR Policy may be updated to align it with the changing requirement or changes in the legal and regulatory framework. Any revision in the Policy shall be approved by the Board of Directors.

M. CSR Committee

As per section 135 of the companies act 2013 read with the Companies (Corporate Social Responsibility) Rules, 2014 as amended the provision related to constitution of CSR committee are not applicable to company till the CSR expenditure to be incurred is upto Rs. 50.00 Lacs.
